Over the past two decades, water conservation has proven a reliable way to manage water demands in Colorado. Reduced per capita water use has enabled some communities to serve growing populations with even less water. Much progress has been made on indoor and outdoor water savings through local retrofits, rebate programs and legislation that prohibits the sale of high water use plumbing and irrigation fixtures. But more can be done.
- When it comes to efficient use and reducing municipal water waste, what will move the needle the most for our growing cities and towns? What are the broader policies and programs that will continue to drive water efficiency? These are big questions for water conservation across Colorado. Each year, the Colorado Water Congress presents the prestigious Wayne N. Aspinall Water Leader of the Year Award to a Coloradan who has long demonstrated courage, dedication, knowledge and strong leadership in development, protection, and preservation of Colorado water.

Tim Quinn, Stanford University, Executive Officer of CAP
In addition to the technical challenges of water management in the 21st century, water leaders need to focus systematically on governance – that is, how to structure decision-making processes that are more likely to produce “good water policy”. Tim Quinn focused on the issue of governance during his fellowship at the Stanford University, Water in the West Program, following his 2018 retirement from a 40+ year career in California water management. This presentation summarizes the lessons learned in that research, especially the importance of relying on collaborative decision-making processes, and how those lessons are being applied “on the ground” in the San Joaquin Valley of California today. - 9:45-10:15** **Colorado River Modeling Results**
Jim Prairie, U.S. Bureau of Reclamation and Center for Advanced Decision Support for Water and Environmental Systems
Reclamation’s Upper and Lower Colorado Basin Regions use a suite of models for annual, mid-, and long-term planning. The models contain “rule sets” that simulate operation of major reservoirs in the Colorado River basin including how water is delivered under various hydrologic conditions. Projections show the future state of the Colorado River system on a monthly basis. The models help policy makers understand hydrology, sources of uncertainty, impacts of key modeling assumptions, and likely outcomes of policy decisions. Following the Upper Basin Drought Response Operations Agreement that was triggered in January 2021, the Probable Minimum and Probable Maximum inflow scenarios are run every month. Jim will provide an overview of what the current modeling is telling us.
